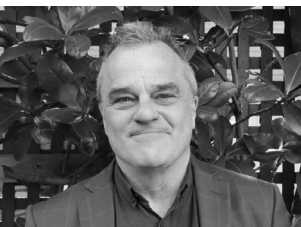

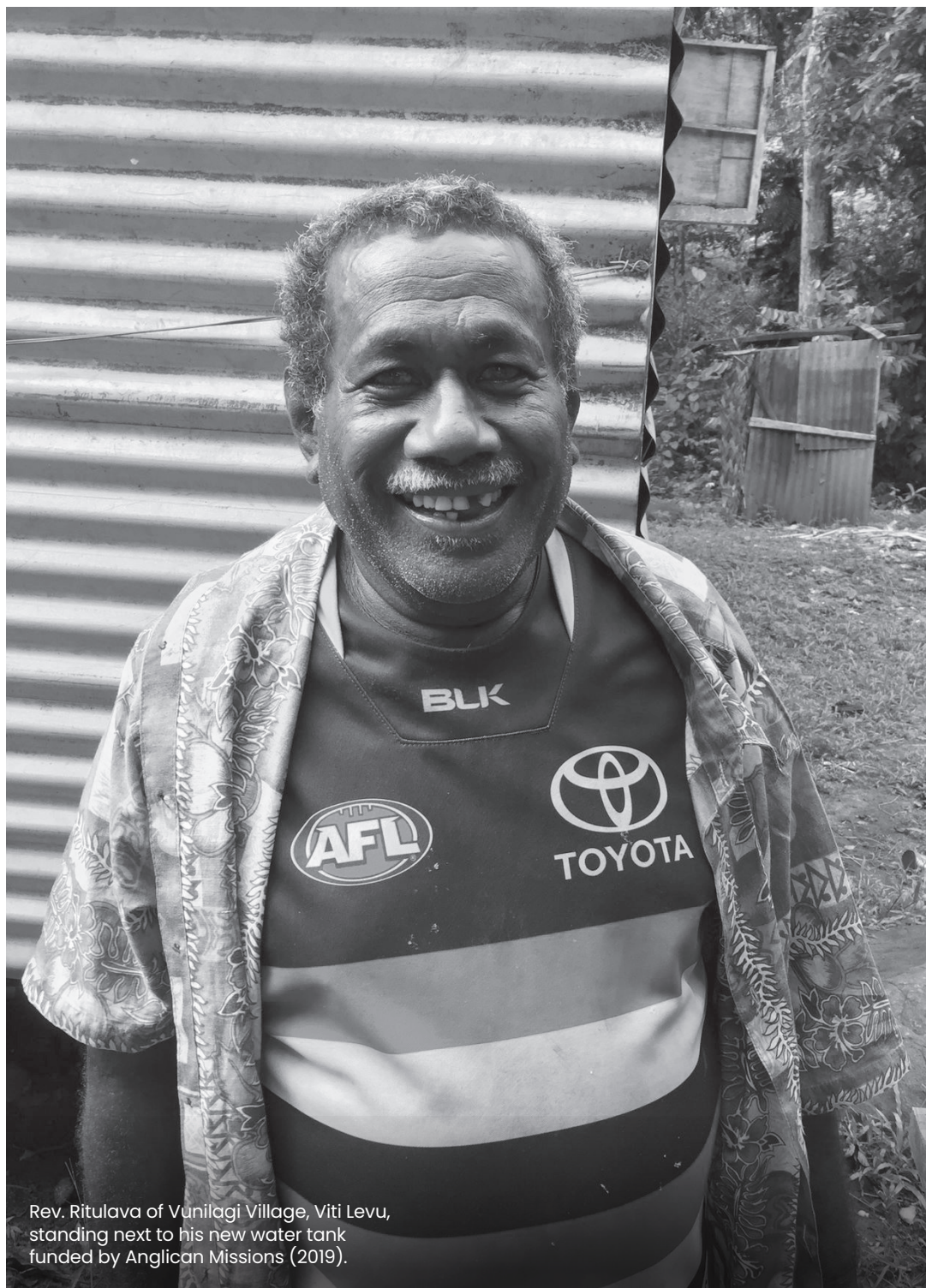

The Five Marks of Mission are an important statement on mission.

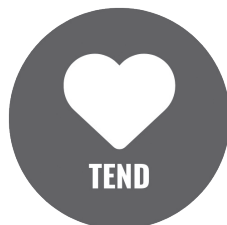
They express the worldwide Anglican Church's common commitments to, and understanding of, God's holistic and integral mission. The mission of the Church is the mission of Christ.
