



Gazan aid workers are being killed despite systems meant to protect them.

Aid groups use a system called "deconfliction" to notify military authorities of planned movements. In Gaza, this goes through COGAT, Israel's military liaison office. But the system is failing.

On April 1, seven World Central Kitchen workers were killed despite having preapproved clearance. Aid officials say COGAT "operates like a switchboard without an operator."

Over 1,500 medical staff have been killed in Gaza, including Dr Ahmad Qandil, a surgeon at Ahli Hospital, who died in a drone strike after finishing surgery.

Humanitarians warn that Israel's recent adjustments are not enough. Without a credible deconfliction mechanism—and a ceasefire—relief work in Gaza remains deadly.
